Illustrative Successes:

- developed a comprehensive plan to support the rural cooperative system by introducing member-owned cooperatives with the Peoples' Bank of China and the Agricultural Bank of China (China)
- facilitated export sales of fruits, vegetables, nuts and tea valued at more than \$11 million (Georgia)
- enabled growth of leasing companies' client portfolios and capital expansion (Georgia)
- partnering with leading Indian agribusiness firm applying IT to the commercialization of small-scale producers through e-Choupal to help farmers access real-time production and market information, weather forecasts and other critical information for enhancing sales (India)
- increased cocoa farmer annual incomes by 25 percent

- disbursed over 29,000 total loans (Global)
- created and maintained over 10,000 jobs from loans disbursed (Iraq)
- facilitated integration of growth-oriented microenterprises into productive markets and access to business services and credit, resulting in partnerships with over 20 firms, NGOs and government agencies to ensure coordinated supply chain development and improved technical service center support (India)
