

ACDI/VOCA IN LATIN AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN

Since 1967, ACDI/VOCA has supported community and economic development initiatives in 11 countries throughout Latin American and the Caribbean with funding from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and its Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA), the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), national governments, private sector partners, and others. These initiatives have increased the incomes of smallholder cacao and coffee producers in Ecuador, Colombia, Peru, and Guatemala and supported peace and reconciliation in Colombia. They have strengthened market systems in Honduras, provided workforce development in Colombia, and helped communities adapt to climate shocks in Paraguay, Jamaica, and Haiti. ACDI/VOCA's community development initiatives have also bolstered livelihoods throughout Bolivia, Brazil, Nicaragua, and Panama.

WHERE WE WORK

COLOMBIA

ACDI/VOCA implements multiple projects in Colombia, including the USAID-funded Program of Alliances for Reconciliation (PAR), which engages communities in reconciliation following 50 years of armed conflict through memory, truth telling, and collaboration with the private sector. In partnership with PAR, the Work for Reconciliation program, which is funded by USAID, Diageo, and the government of Colombia, uses its employability model to help youth overcome barriers to formal employment. Other efforts include the USAID/OFDA-funded Emergency Response in Arauca program, which tackles the pressing needs of people who have migrated due to the crisis in Venezuela and the communities that receive them.

HONDURAS

In Honduras, the USAID-funded Transforming Market Systems activity finds opportunities to make deep-rooted systemic changes to market systems that catalyze long-term, broadbased economic growth and provide jobs and income sources for marginalized populations. This allows communities to become self-reliant and reduces incentives for migration.

JAMAICA

As Jamaica continues to experience more frequent natural disasters, the USAID-funded Jamaica Rural Economy and Ecosystems Adapting to Climate Change II project is expanding on its first iteration's efforts by collaborating with the government and other partners to stimulate climate change adaptation and mitigation and to engage youth in climate change advocacy.
